## MASTER OF ARTS IN EDUCATION AND HUMAN DEVELOPMENT IN THE FIELD OF CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION

The curriculum and instruction program at George Washington University's Graduate School of Education and Human Development examines research and reflective practice related to curriculum, teaching and learning, teacher education, and broader educational policies. The program applies curriculum and instruction research and practice in the context of educational reform for diverse student populations. Students become part of a community connecting scholars with practicing professionals, policymakers, and educational organizations. Master's degree students can choose to work toward improving their practice or to conduct research within subject domains of K-12 curriculum or with a concentration in elementary education, literacy and reading education, and interdisciplinary studies. Students choose to pursue the degree in one of three concentrations:

Please be sure you request a detailed evaluation that includes all course titles, credit hours, grade-point average (GPA), United States degree equivalency, and date of degree conferral.
